Foundation Finances

Contributions made to PVSD Foundation are an investment in stronger educational programs for students and, therefore, an investment in our community. Every time the school district is able to incorporate new and updated programs that challenge and empower students, our students' academic potential grows and our school district community is strengthened. Strong school districts attract new residents, businesses, and students to our community.

Perkiomen Valley School District relies on donations, the Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program, grants, fundraisers, and interest to support our mission.



Education Improvement Tax Credit (EITC)

PVSD Foundation has been approved by the PA Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) as an educational improvement organization for the 24-25 school year.

Through EITC, a state program that provides companies with tax credits for donations to a non-profit educational improvement organizations, a business can receive a tax credit equal to 75% of a contribution (up to \$750,000). Credits can be increased to 90% of the contribution if a business agrees to provide the same amount for two consecutive years. By donating to the Foundation through EITC, you are supporting public education and keeping state tax dollars in the local community.

Types of businesses that are eligible: C-Corporations, S-Corporations, Partnerships, Sole Proprietors, Limited Liability Companies (LLCs), Subchapter S-Corporations, and other businesses that pay their state business taxes under the personal income tax on PA business income.

Death, Loss, & Grief

The Foundation awarded (now) Dr. Patti Colucci a mini-grant to provide comforting items while staff went through a Death, Loss, and Grief Professional Development.

Perkiomen Valley School District understands that, unfortunately, it is an inevitable experience that, at some point, we will all lose someone close to us. In PA, 1 in 11 children will experience the death of a parent or sibling before they graduate. These times of loss can happen at critical developmental stages that can affect student growth academically, emotionally, and socially. During this highly sensitive training, staff gained insights into how to help students navigate the uncertain times surrounding losing a loved one.

Dr. Colucci was able to turn this mini-grant into something much more. Because several staff members from each building attended the training, each school in the district has earned the designation of Grief-Sensitive School from New York Life Foundation.

With the designation of a Grief Sensitive School, each school received \$500 to enhance the grief support and resources available. Following in the footsteps of the Unpack It mini-grant we awarded Skippack in October 2023, Evergreen, Schwenksville, and South are creating their own version of the Unpack It totes to assist students and families when they experience death. The middle schools and high schools are investing in resources to support students and staff during their grief.



Anatomage Table

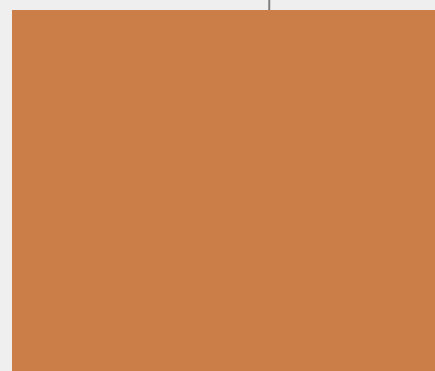
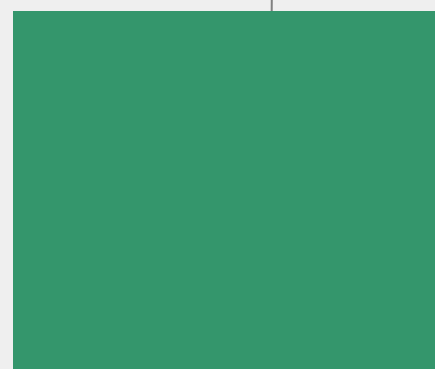
This past year, Anatomy and Zoology classes began an exciting journey with the Anatomage Table—a state-of-the-art virtual dissection and anatomy platform that is transforming the way our students experience science. The table has allowed students to interact with life-sized, fully segmented human and animal anatomy models, providing a deeper understanding of body systems and their interconnectivity.

The Anatomage Table has already brought noticeable changes to the way Dr. Fitzhenry teaches and how students learn. Instruction now bridges dissection with clinical case studies, allowing students to more clearly understand the interplay between structure and function in the human body. With the ability to explore real-life medical scenarios—such as strokes, pacemaker implantation, and heart attacks—students not only engage with anatomical structures but also with the physiology behind them. They analyze EKGs, scans, and clinical notes to build a deeper, case-based understanding of body systems.

While using the Anatomage Table's teachers sharing platform to assist in the creation of lesson plans, Dr. Fitzhenry has also shared her final labs she has done with the Anatomage Table and will continue to do so as her lessons and knowledge of the Anatomage Table increase.

Dr. Fitzhenry is excited that there has been a slight increase in enrollment in anatomy for the 2025-2026 school year, suggesting that the table has removed the barrier of traditional dissection and has made the course more accessible and appealing to some students.

This coming school year will focus on refining our lessons and deepening student engagement. While the Anatomage Table will not yet make its way into additional courses, Dr. Fitzhenry is continuing to explore all of the many capabilities and laying the foundation for intentional implementation into other courses.



Ken, the facility dog

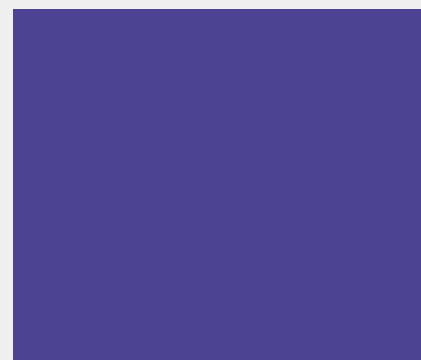
It has been nothing short of remarkable to witness the impact Ken has had on students and staff over the past year at Middle School West. The handlers have observed Ken reducing students' stress and anxiety simply by being in his presence. We have witnessed students instantly shift from sadness and upset to joy and happiness within seconds of petting him. This shift in affect is the first step towards improved mental health.

One of the biggest struggles middle school students face is regulating their emotions. With Ken's presence, handlers have found it exponentially easier to support students in achieving a more regulated, calm emotional state. When students' emotions are regulated and their anxiety and stress are reduced, they can then tap into the part of their brain that enables them to problem-solve, create, and concentrate (to name a few). Ken has been an enormous support when working with students to process their grief. He provides a level of comfort that exceeds what would be achieved without his presence.

One example of how Ken provides joy and comfort to many students every single day is during bus duty. Every morning, Jen (his primary handler & caretaker) and Ken stand outside and watch the buses pull in. They watch as sleepy faces burst into big smiles as they see Ken through the windows. It's like this all day – as soon as a staff member or a student sees him, their mood is instantly transformed to one of joy and happiness. When Ken showers them with his attention, nothing else exists, and the smile never leaves their face. This brief moment in time can have a profound impact on a student's mood. It is a much better start to their day as well!



I think all schools in the district should have dogs. In my school, we have a dog named Ken. He is a Goldendoodle, and he is very calm, and he is there when you need him. You would still have to gain his trust so he would feel comfortable around you. Ken can be helpful for kids when they need a break to calm down. When I'm doing my work, and he is sitting calmly near me. It reminds me that I should be relaxed too, and that calm mood helps my brain know to focus on my work. You can also earn time to just have fun with him. Having a dog in other schools would be good because it could break kids' fears about dogs. I also think that having a dog in school would be good because you can learn about dog life and how dogs adjust to many kids. -MSW 7th grader

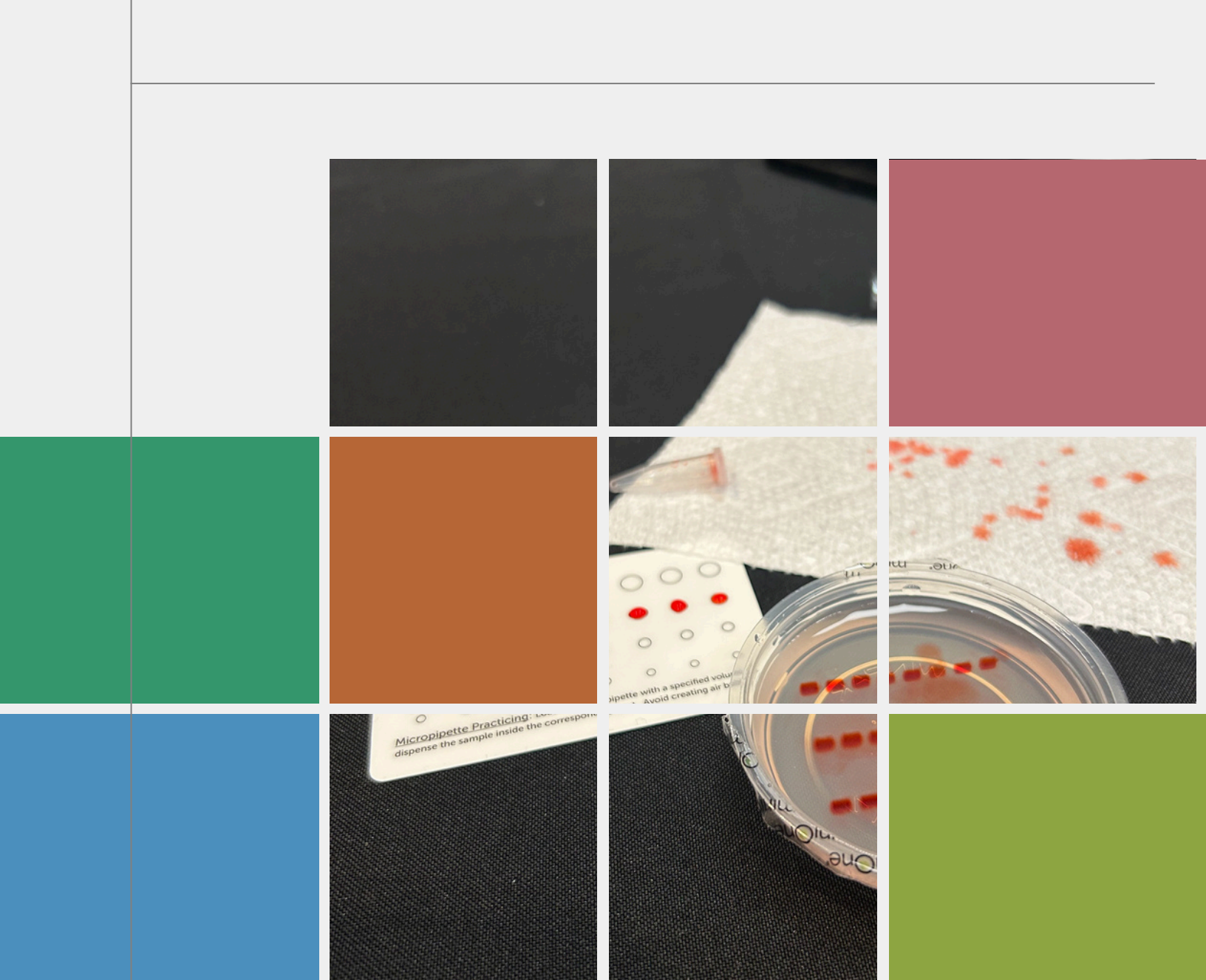


Pam Kirkman Scholarship
